April 2006 Kinglake National Park News

At the time of writing, it is mid March; the national park has been focussed on two major issues; Recovering from the January wildfire and preparing for the upcoming autumn prescribed burning.

Even now, two months after the initial fire outbreak we are up to our fourth major "flare up", where hot spots deep in the ground have re-ignited the carpet of dry eucalypt leaves scorched off by the original fire, and started a new fire. This is not unusual, nor unexpected, which is why even now constant patrols are maintained and fire towers are keeping a vigilant eye on the area. (In 1982, the year of the Ash Wednesday bushfires, the Wallaby Creek catchment had thirty five re-lights after their original outbreak.)

Rehabilitation is well under way; we are hoping to be completed by the end of April. Captains Creek road is now open; Boggy Creek road should be open by the time this article goes to print. Now is a great time to take a drive along these tracks (dry weather only) and witness first hand the startling regeneration that is taking place. Regeneration from a major fire is an event not often seen, so take the opportunity. Many people find it quite an inspiring time, witnessing the unfurling of fronds and the bursting out of new growth.

Road reopening is a process where dangerous fire damaged trees are identified and removed if needed, and the road re-formed or graded if required, and pipes and bridges assessed.

A team of three excavators are working their way across the 80km of bulldozed fire tracks and re-covering the side cut and topsoil so the track has the best chance at growing back to its pre fire state. If we left all the tracks UN-touched, it would be a "free for all" for every feral cat, dog and fox in the area to move easily into new territory with big impacts on the native animals. Recreational vehicles could also cause problems if they were allowed unmanaged onto open dozer lines. As well, the soil erosion of the bare tracks would significantly contribute to a loss of water quality in the streams.

The Gums camping area is still closed due to its close proximity to the fire. At this stage we are still unsure about re-opening the Gums camping area for the Easter period, it will depend largely on the weather, and the rate of fire rehabilitation. No Easter holiday program will be offered this year.

Due to the Kinglake bushfire, three prescribed Fuel Reduction Burns (FRBs) will not be conducted this autumn. One FRB, because the fire has already burnt it, the other two because we have

committed resources to the fire rehabilitation program. The two FRBs removed from this years' program are the area south of Gordons Bridge road, and, the 10 chain reserve below Hawkes road and past MMM centre to Browns corner.

Planned FRBs will be:

- 1/ Mt Beggary / Mt Everard
- 2/ North of Toorourrong Reservoir /No 1 road
- 3/ Nth Silver Creek

There will also be forestry regeneration slash burns in Mt. Robertson State Forest and Toolangi State Forest that will be visible from the Kinglake area.

Weed spraying contractors are due to start work treating Tutsan at Hirts Creek in an area under the powerlines. The burn has created a unique opportunity to get into many hard-to-get-to infestations. Other target weeds will include Blackberry at the park boundary and around the burn perimeter. Once again we are concerned that seed could be carried by birds and foxes into the burn from other areas.

We will also be starting a predator control program during May in the fire ravaged Wombelano Block and this will run for a month. Soft-jawed trapping will be used by a certified Pest Animal Contractor to lesson the Red fox populations and this will interrupt winter pairing and breeding. Feral cats will also be targeted at the same time. Roaming dogs can be trapped at times and if this happens, the pet dogs or pet cats will be delivered to the closest pound. If you do own pet dogs or pet cats please see that they are in at night and not roaming outside your property during the day.

Recent spotlighting surveys have revealed that the bush is particularly quiet following the fire. No doubt that many animals died. However already there are signs that animals did survive. Black Wallabies and Lyrebirds have moved up from the damp gullies. Common Wombats have awoken from a long sleep deep within their burrows. Greater Gliders, Ring-tailed Possum and Brush-tailed Possums were observed feeding high in the canopies of unburnt trees. And Wedge-tailed eagles circle looking for a prey item.

Residents in Old Kinglake Road and Brennan Avenue have commenced establishing a Fireguard Group. This is a communications plan that is activated in the event of elevated bushfire risk, which enables residents to know where neighbours are if fire is threatening the area, and to communicate accurate information. It is being put together with assistance from the CFA.

Although the process has been somewhat slow-moving, it is expected that, in addition to providing a communications plan, it will be a means of raising awareness about what to expect and how to minimise fire-related risk in the local area .

CRIME WAVE AT STEELS CREEK

Spencer Burgess was charged with stealing from the dwelling of Chas. Edwards, a labourer, residing at Steels Creek. It appears that the prosecutor and his wife left their residence on the 21st March for a visit to Coranderrk, where the former had been working. They returned home on the 26th March, where they found that the house had been entered, and two boxes of wearing apparel, valued at 9 pounds, had been abstracted.

The missing boxes were found empty on the same day among some ferns near the house.

On the 8th April the prisoner was met by a constable wearing some of Mr. Edward's underclothing, and a quantity of the stolen property was found in his hut about a mile distant from Edwards's house. Prisoner on being arrested admitted having taken the property, and said a man named Robert Sutton was with him at the time and took a portion of the proceeds of the robbery. Sutton's place was searched, but none of the stolen property was found in it. The prisoner was found guilty, and sentenced to 18 months imprisonment with hard labour.

STEELS CREEK COMMUNITY CENTRE INC. DISCUSSION PAPER

BACKGROUND

The Steels Creek Community Centre has been utilized by the local community in its present form since 1992. The premises were secured at that time by the then SSCC secretary Rex Bean, together with other community members, when the shire purchased the property from the state government. The centre was made available to the community at no cost other than normal ongoing maintenance.

The property is controlled by an elected committee of local community members.

HISTORY

The current building is the third to be constructed on the present site. The building was utilized as the Steels Creek primary school from 1870 until 1992.

The building remains the lone historical link with the Steels Creek past. The principle building, in addition to related sheds and trees, received a shire heritage overlay with state government approval in 2004.

CURRENT CONDITION

Current condition of principle building, related outbuildings, water tanks, toilets, drains etc. are serviceable, but several matters will require attention in times to come. The building is lined with asbestos. Due to this fact together with general age and condition, shire has indicated no expenditure will be utilized on the property at any time in the future.

STEELS CREEK TENNIS CLUB

The Steels Creek Tennis Club, for many years has had concerns regarding safety and inadequacy of suitable parking at their courts.

With this in mind, during the latter half of 2005, the shire was contacted and a meeting of relevant personnel was conducted at the courts. During this meeting, Ron Pierce, Shire Contracts Officer, Recreational Services suggested an option may be to construct a new community centre with adequate parking adjacent to tennis courts, if relevant land could be purchased.

With new aspects now introduced to discussions, a report was made to the subsequent SSCC committee meeting and a sub-committee of Albert Leckie, Malcolm Calder and John Lowe was founded.

This sub-committee has had a further follow-up meeting in recent months with Ron Pierce. Also present at that meeting was Councillor Jeanette McRae.

PROPOSED NEW FACILITY

Mr Pierce advised sub-committee members the shire only becomes involved in properties which have a multi use, *i.e.* utilized by several clubs and groups. He also advised any facility would have seating for 120, facilities for the disabled, a modern kitchen and off-street parking.

Any new facility would also be suitable for special needs such as a rest area for fire crews during an emergency situation.

WHERE ARE WE NOW?

The shire is currently conducting a feasibility study which will include a strategic meeting relating to planning permits and the green wedge situation.

The committee will be provided with more information in due course.

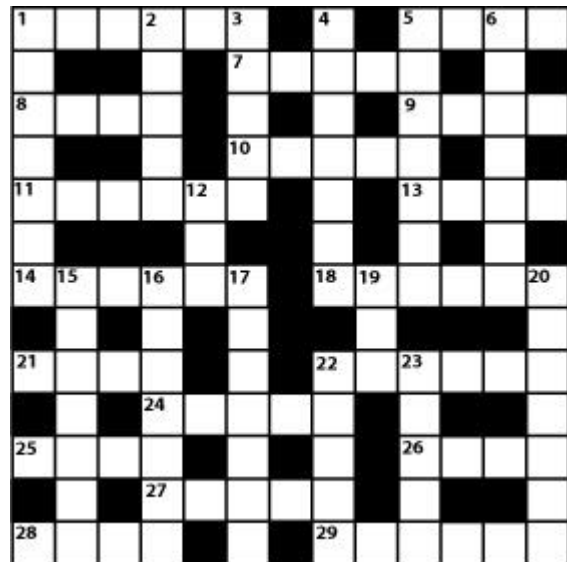
