Since June 1996 a team of loyal distributors has visited an increasing number of letter boxes every second month to deliver the 76 editions of *The Jolly Thing*. Currently we print 220 copies of each edition, and these are privately distributed by eleven volunteers. In addition, over one hundred households receive *T.J.T.* by e-mail or post. I'm sure you can see that this is now a major organizational task of increasing costs (financial and environmental) to the volunteers who so reliably get the news to you.

The general feedback from the community is that people enjoy reading *T.J.T.* even if they play little or no part in the many activities available through the Steels Creek Community Centre. It is widely recognized as a major contributor to the success of the Steels Creek Community Centre; so there is every reason to continue its publication and distribution. But we do need to keep up with the times and recognize the dramatic changes in communication technology that have occurred in the nearly 12 years since the paper first appeared. We also need to be aware of the environmental impacts and costs of printing and hand delivery.

The next issue (April/May, 2009) of *T.J.T.* will be the last one that will be hand delivered to your letterbox or polypipe. From June 2009 you will be able to get *T.J.T.* in one of the following ways:-

Notes from your SCCC Committee

Fire in Steels Creek.

On Sunday, 25 January, a small grass fire started late in the afternoon in grass on private property in Pinnacle Lane. Temperatures were in the low 30's and a light southerly wind was blowing. With a spectacularly short response time, the CFA were at the scene with 5 or 6 units by which time the fire had crossed Pinnacle Lane and threatened farmland to the north. The fire was declared safe after 20 minutes or so much to the relief of all.

The Steels Creek community, once again, thanks the dedicated men and women of the CFA for their skills and commitment in providing such an excellent service for the safety of all of us who live in this magnificent area.

THANKS GUYS, YOU DID A GREAT JOB. In return, our responsibility is to make sure that all our vehicles, including recreation vehicles such as dirt bikes, are fire-safe.

Road Names

Whilst I am not sure when it was, I believe I saw some discussion of the proper names of the roads from Steels Creek to Kinglake. With the advent of the fire season, it might be worthwhile for some clarification. There are three roads or tracks connecting Steels creek and Kinglake:

1. "**The Old Kinglake/Glenburn Road**" is now closed to traffic shortly after the **Brennan Avenue** junction, it is available for fire traffic.

2, "**Mt Slide Road**" runs from the **Steels Creek Road, Greenwood Lane** intersection and up to the **Healesville-Kinglake Road**. This is generally called the Steels Creek Road, by people in Kinglake and conversely the Kinglake road by people this end. Both are less than helpful! It is also sometimes referred to as the "**old**" **Mt. Slide road**. This is also confusing as there is no "new" Mt Slide road. The hill on the Melba Highway that runs up to the **Healesville-Kinglake Road** is known as "**The Slide**", but best called the **Melba Highway**. So when using the name Mt Slide Road, always give the nearest intersection as "**Steels Creek Road / Greenwood Lane**" or, at its upper end, "**The Healesville-Kinglake Road**. There was a serious Motor Vehicle accident on this Road on Friday 16th January, and the pager message to CFA members from Vicfire correctly identified the location.

3. The **Brock Spur Track** which rejoins the **Melba Highway** and is also closed to traffic.

It is the second, **Mt Slide Road**, which is most frequently used as it is the only one open to local traffic. This name is in the Vicfire mapping system.

Are your fire-plans in place, up-to-date, and have you practiced? Is your property fire ready? Do you have the personal protection clothing you need in the event of fire, and can you find it in a hurry? Are your financial and personal records safe from fire? Have you made appropriate plans for pets and livestock?

Sweet Dreams are Made of Cheese

My London correspondent has recently advised that the age old myth that cheese gives you **nightmares** has finally been laid to rest recently following the release of a **new study carried out by the British Cheese Board**. The in-depth **Cheese & Dreams study**, a first of its kind, reveals that eating cheese before bed will not only aid a good night's sleep but **different cheeses will in fact cause different types of dreams**. The study notes that a lot of people still believe the old wives tale that cheese gives you nightmares but this study endorses more **scientific facts**. *"One of the amino acids in cheese – tryptophan – has been shown to reduce stress and induce sleep so cheese may actually help you have a good night's sleep,"* says Dr Judith Bryans, Nutrition Scientist at The Dairy Council. The Changing Face Of Yarra Glen.

Yarra Glen is rather like a teenager going through a major growth period. Let's hope it comes out of this phase with the look of a welcoming country town. The most obvious change is the new shopping complex with its "butterfly wing" roof over a much-enlarged supermarket; a large parking area; and the landscaped wetland area replacing a neglected open space on the Yarra floodplain.

This development, controversial when it was first proposed, has, over a period of two or three years, changed in small ways to meet some of the concerns of the community and the Shire- we can now take a more objective view of what is almost completed.

I personally was opposed to the large scale of the development, and I had reservations about the impact on the smaller traders in Yarra Glen, and the lack of connectedness of the building to the existing shopping complex and to the rest of the town. Many people expressed concern about effects on adjacent residential properties and the appropriateness in a country town of the roof-top car park.

Clearly Ritchies IGA Supermarket has taken supermarket shopping in Yarra Glen to a new level. We had become used to the friendly, family- run IGA of the McBrides. A visit to the old supermarket was like paying a visit to friends and **we all appreciate the hard work and willing service given by the McBrides and their staff. Thanks to you all.** A plus of the new market is that so many of the former staff are still employed by IGA. The new supermarket has a much wider range of products and the staff are efficient and friendly. An added advantage is the Community Benefits Programme which is a Ritchies IGA policy. On balance, the new supermarket is an improvement for Yarra Glen.

The new landscape on the floodplain is developing well. Australian plants are a feature with an emphasis on local indigenous species. Adjacent to, and within the car park, and closer to the building, other natives more appropriate to the function of the area are chosen and there are young trees which hopefully will be providing shade and shelter not too far down the track. While it is hard to see just how this landscape will finally look, the framework and much of the planting is complete. The development of the wetlands is another significant improvement to the appeal of Yarra Glen; certainly the water birds have given it their stamp of approval!

My concerns about the lack of connectedness with the rest of the Yarra Glen shops are still very real and for many shoppers Yarra Glen is now a two stop shopping town. We really do need better pedestrian access from the Point Pleasant car park ; and would a Post Box in the IGA be a way to help those with letters to post? Would traffic lights or a small roundabout at the Bell Street exit from the IGA car park make it easier to drive out onto Bell Street? No doubt there will be opportunities for improvements as we learn our way through the new facilities.

The whole project is not yet fully functional and should not be prejudged. However, I still find the roof-line over the main floor inappropriate in a rural setting and, sadly, the wonderful view of the mountains which appeared so appealingly in the glossy brochure published during the lengthy approval process, cannot be seen from Bell Street as was implied. I understand that some neighbours have had problems with the night security lighting from the upper car park.

Chris O'Connor of Yarra Valley Land Developments has been very involved in the day-to-day management of the project and has been responsive to some minor changes suggested by the community, the Shire and the Planning Panel. Hopefully, the final outcome will be to the lasting benefit of Yarra Glen and District. **Malcolm Calder**


