TWO STORIES OF SURVIVAL.

Jane and I have lived in Steels Creek for over 30 years and one of the great pleasures we get out of our garden is to watch the birds that visit us, or have made their home here. We reckon we have seen around 120 different species in the thirty years. Not all these birds are equally welcome. Parrots of all sorts have a special love of seeds and the fact that some of their favourite seeds are produced in the core of the apple is no problem to them. We know, like all of you who grow apples that we need to net the trees just as we net the vines to protect them from the miners, crows, currawongs, starlings etc. Keeping the birds from eating your fruit and vegies sometimes feels like a battle for survival.

There is whole swag of other birds that feed on bugs that are pests in the garden, and possibly top amongst these is our good friend the Willie Wagtail. Willie Wagtails are among the iconic birds of Australia and found throughout the country in gardens, farms and open bush. I was surprised to find that they are not native to Tasmania, although there are now a few places where they have been seen there following introduction. I think we all know the squeaky call of the Willie Wagtail, even in the middle of the night if there is a bright moon shining.



This year we had a pair of Wagtails nest really close to the house at a height that I could actually look into the nest with my camera. I thought I would get a sequence of photos showing the life story of the young birds. It took the parent birds about a week to build the very neat, bowl-shaped nest and then 3 eggs were laid over about 4 days. The parents sat on these eggs for 13 days, but one must have been a dud because there were only 2 chicks in the nest when I first photographed them. Both

parents fed these chicks till around day 10 when I noticed a bit of Wagtail agitation and a raven (crow) flew out of the tree.

So I think that one of the chicks had been the raven's breakfast. When the last chick had opened its eyes and was half feathered I got my last photo and three days later the chick had flown. So the whole process from start to finish took around 5 weeks resulting in one chick surviving. Not a high reproductive rate but probably around the average for Willie Wagtails as a whole. This is another story of survival

WEATHER REPORT

We had good rainfall in April with the total being 20 mm above average. However, May was 30 mm below average with 24 mm falling in the last four days. We are currently 14 mm below average for the year so far. Temperatures for April were slightly above average with the mean daily maximum temperatures for Melbourne being 0.5° above & Coldstream 0.3° above. May temperatures were also slightly above average with Melbourne 0.7° above & Coldstream 0.3° above.

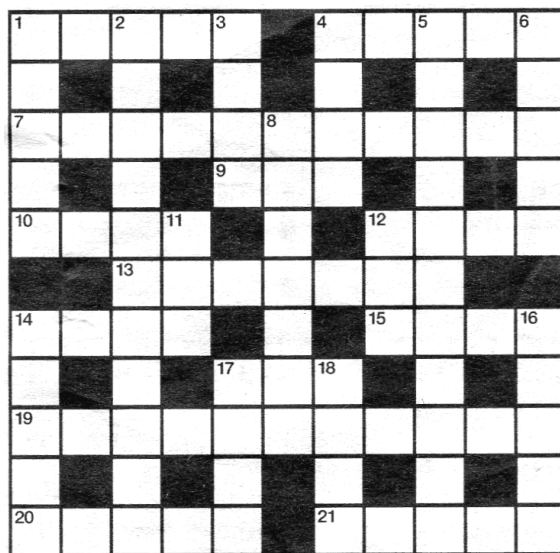
