Editor's note:

What I love about Steels Creek

When Graham and I came to Steels Creek in July 2008 we anticipated enjoying the "Country Life" but had no idea of how much we would love the place that we had chosen, so for the benefit of those who may not have already experienced all that there is to offer here these are a couple of things that we relish. If there is something that **you** love about Steels creek send it along and I will include it in the next edition of The Jolly Thing. For now, here are a couple of my favourites

1. **The Movie Night**, now that doesn't sound like much, an old movie and dinner(although for a bargain price of \$10) but what you get is anywhere from 12 to 25 locals (aged ranging from 35 to 85yrs) all sitting around and enjoying a fabulous meal supplied by a variety of people. The food varies but there are always good cheeses and bread which is generally consumed with the first glass of local red or white wine (BYO), then sometimes a home-made soup (pea and ham, Thai pumpkin, vegetable) then a salad or two and the main course which have included things like lasagne, home-made sausage rolls, chicken pasta, green curry and rice, fried rice, chicken cacciatore all washed down with great conversation. Not finished there we have deserts which could be a crumble a Pavlova or a delicious trifle.

Organised by Keith and Lindy Montell an offer to contribute to the dinner is always appreciated (and you then don't even need to pay) but you are welcome to come and enjoy other people's culinary skills. If you haven't come along before or even not for a while, you owe it to yourself. Next Movie is on March 11th so add it to your calendar.

2. **Twice monthly market** on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of each month the community centre holds a market, (originally started as a "swap meet") it has people bringing along extra produce from their gardens. You never know what will be there but free range eggs, jams, chutney and pickles, fresh goats cheese, home-made cards, bunches of Rhubarb, a bucket of lemons (and don't we all appreciate not paying \$2 each from the supermarket) local honey or a few vegetables are usually on offer. At 9.55am the first few people turn up, the coffee machine gets set up (did I tell you we have great coffee?) There are fresh scones with jam and cream for the bargain price of \$1 for a scone, we chat, meet any new people and at about 10.45 announcements are made from all the groups who are part of Steels Creek (which is a great way to find out if there is something else you would like to experience.)

Community Centre Maintenance – show a little Love

The Centre grounds are always in need of a little TLC and this time of year the weeds do tend to get out of hand surprisingly quickly. It seems like yesterday that we held our last working bee to prepare the centre for the flower show. We did do a significant tidy-up then, including weed removal.

However, the weeds are now coming back with a vengeance (a little warmth and rain will do that I hear!) They will soon become a problem again.

We did have a very limited number of people turn up to our last working bee event for the flower show - and I do sincerely thank those who turned up and put the effort in. It is often the most usual of suspects that put in their valuable time and effort.

We can certainly hold another working bee after an upcoming market but if anyone has some time available to knock off a few weeds around the place in the meantime, it would be greatly appreciated. In fact, if you see anything that needs doing around the place when you're using the centre, please just let the committee members know.

If you have any time to spare before or after one of the community events, such as the fortnightly market, please do what you can to help keep the grounds in "ship shape". Otherwise, we will have to try and schedule in another working bee soon.

30 YEARS ON, "THANK YOU" STEELS CREEK

We have been living in Steels Creek now for thirty years. Thirty years is a big slice of life and in that time many families have come into the valley and others have passed on or moved away. We can think of only a few families who were living here in 1986 when we arrived and are still living here now. Our thirty-year anniversary seems a good time to think about the valley and how it came to be the place we know today.

European settlement in Steels Creek goes back to at least 1850 when the Ryries and Bells took up land around Yarra Glen. This history is recorded in the book "Living with Fire" by Christine Hansen and Tom Griffiths. In 1986 we found a very active community based around the Tennis and Social Club, and the Steels Creek Primary School. The Tennis/Social Club was the social hub and the school brought families together and, among other things, the Parents Committee ran an evening adult education programme with a grant from the Education Department. There was also the SC Book-club, meeting monthly in member's houses. Community life was based around the two centres and there were many stories about the wonders of past cricket and tennis teams, especially in regard to the great contests with the primary opponents - Dixons Creek. Steels Creek seemed to us to be a wonderfully connected, country community, proud of its history and with confidence in its future. Newcomers were warmly welcomed.

We were still working in Melbourne for the first few years and so we joined the ranks of the commuter with little time for community things. However, we did attend most of the evening talks at the school covering such things as using the chainsaw, planting windbreaks, and "chats with your local councillor", and the annual safety talks from the CFA. Most of these talks were from locals who had a wealth of experience in Steels Creek. Then in late 1991 came the first of several crises that have occurred in our time here. The State Government decided to close the Steels Creek Primary School, effective from the start of the next year.

Recognising the school as a key facility in the valley with a long history, a group of us decided that it would make a great community centre where the SC Book Group, the embryonic SC Garden Club and the adult education programme could continue. And by then there was also a small market held twice a month. After the Education Department decided that they had no need for the property, they removed the portable classroom, and the land, (that had originally been donated to the Department more than 100 years earlier¹), became "Unoccupied Crown Land" available to be sold. It was revealed that some of the land to the north of the School, part of the playground, actually belonged to the Anglican Church. The Church reclaimed the title and sold the land. We continued to use the School building, running costs being met by a \$1 per person contribution and access to a fund of around \$8,000 by the adult education programme. A small committee was formed, including a representative each from the Tennis/social Club and the Garden Club, to manage the Centre and the land around. All this was very low profile stuff until we realised that the State Government was serious about the sale of the property.

Clearly the community did not have the resources to purchase the School. The Committee held meetings and deputations to the then Shire of Healesville, to our local State Member of Parliament and to anyone we thought had influence with the Government or Shire. This was the time of the Shire amalgamations and the Commissioners of the new Shire of Yarra Ranges were reluctant to take on the commitment, and the State Government had no intention what so ever of gifting the property to the community. There was a strong thrust of energy within the community and we were fortunate to have on our committee people with strong links into the State Government and wonderful powers of persuasion. Eventually, after a very focused campaign that seemed to go on for ever, the Shire was persuaded to purchase the property from the State Government and set up a Statuary Committee of Management, and so **the Steels Creek Community Centre Committee** was formally established as an incorporated body. The Shire would be responsible for structural maintenance of the building and the Committee for the maintenance of the grounds and the programme of activities. Today, the formal arrangements still apply, with the programme of activities greatly augmented by programmes funded by the Victorian Bushfire Appeal Fund through the Steels Creek Association.

We are so grateful to the various committees and the wider community of Steels Creek for their energy and foresight they had to make Steels Creek the great place it is today. Malcolm and Jane Calder.


